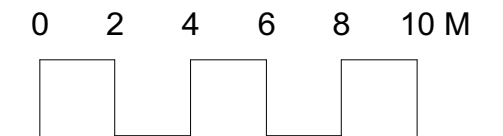
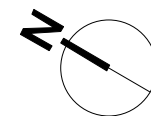

Why implement 'No Mow Zones'?

1. Closely-cut grass is almost an ecological desert. Allowing grass to grow longer with native flowers (e.g. daisies, dandelions, clover) will provide a much greater source of food for pollinators
2. Reduced carbon footprint through less mower use
3. Provide wildlife corridors for mammals as well as pollinator food

But there is still a little bit of mowing to do:-
